Their work has paid off no end and we have a stunning display. The council has even received comments from residents of other parishes, stating how lovely they are and asking how we did it. With any luck this will mean that other villages will have wildflowers growing next summer and we can increase natural habitats across the county.

Grounds person

We are please to announce we have successfully recruited a new grounds person. Many of you will know Tony Brooks from over the allotments, with his wonderful array of fruit and veg but he's soon going to be putting his green fingers to good use around the village. The new position was created in an effort to keep rising costs of external contractors down. By bringing tasks in house we will have more flexibility on what, where and how some work is done. Polite Notice

Please can you ensure that you pick up after your dog. There seems to be an increasing amount of dog mess left on the common and in the village in general. This is certainly an issue over the allotments where we have now asked for dogs to be kept on leads at all times to help with this.

Please also remember that dogs are not permitted on the play equipment area of the common. We know that it is not always possible to stop your dog roaming but if you plan on being towards the play equipment please keep your dog on a lead. We've all had incidences of stepping in poop and it really isn't nice. There is also a health risk, especially to young children. So we politely ask that you clean up after your dog. Thank you.

With any luck, in the next few months we should see Beryl Bikes become available to residents. We are in discussions with them and County Highways, through our county councillor Vic Thomson, to provide two locations for bikes and e-scooters in the village, one opposite the church and one up towards the Crown Point Tavern. Hopefully this will mean that more people will ditch the car and use cycling to get to work or school.

May Gurney site

As you know we were as upset and disappointed as you all were with the sudden removal of the trees on the former May Gurney site. We wanted to be able to give you an update with regards to action about the tree removal but we are unable to at this time. The Forestry Commission are now involved, along with the Environment Agency and South Norfolk District Council and we have been informed that assessments are taking place of the trees that were removed and we will be informed of any next steps.

We have had another discussion with the landowner about the proposed plans for the site and we are keen to maintain a dialogue with them going forward. By doing this we can ensure they are aware of the issues that are important to residents. Some of these issues are traffic, the local ecology, maintaining the village feel and our unique history and natural environment. We have an East Norwich Regeneration working party of councillors along with our own planning consultant to help guide us through this process.

Please do take the time to look through any planning applications for the site and make comments. Any comments are taken into consideration when planning officers make decisions. The proposed design codes documents for the site can be found by scanning the below QR code, or visiting
